
The Business Development Board of Martin County prioritizes supporting its existing businesses, dedicating nearly 80% of its resources to direct engagement with existing industries and local businesses. Following best practices from the International Economic Development Council and the Florida Economic Development Council, this outreach focuses on understanding local contributory businesses, the business climate and identifying any operational challenges to operating in Martin County successfully. By actively listening and responding to the needs of local businesses, the BDB aims to ensure Martin County remains a supportive and thriving environment for all businesses.





ABOUT THE BUSINESSES PULSED

Martin County businesses have demonstrated remarkable resilience for generations, weathering economic downturns from the Great Recession to the recent pandemic. These established companies have proven their agility and adaptability, achieving remarkable global competitiveness through continuous reinvention, innovation, and responsiveness to market demands. The BDB also visits and works with promising startups and second-stage companies capitalizing on emerging industry clusters in Martin County, including additive manufacturing and opportunities related to the area's proximity to the Space Coast.



Florida's manufacturing sector is strong, with over 26,000 companies employing more than 427,000 workers, many of whom have advanced skills, according to FloridaMakes, a BDB partner. Like the rest of the state, Martin County's manufacturing sector is primarily composed of small businesses, with 80% of manufacturers employing fewer than 20 people.


Manufacturing and other commercial and industrial activities are crucial to Martin County's economy, contributing 25% of the county's tax base. These manufacturers create a diverse range of products, including aerospace and Department of Defense components, power generation equipment, communications technology, medical and laboratory equipment and solutions, medical devices, electronics, boats, tools, fragrances, and highly sought-after food and beverage products.

OF THE BUSINESSES WE PULSED IN **2024, THEY REPORTED THAT:**


- 66% of the businesses visited exported more than 75% of their product out of Martin County and to
- 38% have called Martin County home for more than 20 years

• 39% have 10-50 employees, and 46% have under 10.

• 22% are hiring new or have open positions, which is down from 2023.


